The new Chairman and Deputy Chairman are elected

In the context of the above information, in the second half of January, after the call for nominations for the new Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the KPC, in the 193rd meeting in a row, a nomination was presented for each position separately: Prosecutor Jetish Maloku, from the Basic Prosecution of Gjilan, has been nominated for Chairman of the Kosovo Prosecutorial Council, while his deputy has been nominated prosecutor from the Basic Prosecution of Ferizaj, Veton Shabani.



On this occasion, before their voting, the nominated candidates presented their visions for the leadership of the Kosovo Prosecutorial Council, in which case the two nominees presented the actions they will take during their leadership.

Then the voting process for the Chairman of the KPC took place, where with 10 votes in favor and 1 against the prosecutor Jetish Maloku was elected, while with 11 votes in favor and none against the Deputy Chief Prosecutor Veton Shabani was elected.

Acceptance-handover ceremony of the duty of the Chairman

Meanwhile, a ceremony of handover of office of the Chairman of KPC, by Bahri Hyseni to newly elected Chairman, Jetish Maloku was held.

During this ceremony, the current Chairman, Bahri Hyseni, welcomed the new Chairman, Jetish Maloku, on which occasion he stressed that he feels honored to have had the opportunity to be a member of the Kosovo Prosecutorial Council for five years, and within these five years, two years

at the helm of this important institution in the justice system of Kosovo.



On the other hand, the new Chairman of the Council, Jetish Maloku, after thanking the current Chairman for his contribution to the development of the prosecutorial system, said that increasing accountability, transparency, integrity and strengthening their mechanisms in the prosecutorial system will be only part of its objectives for strengthening this system.

Reception of the Chairman of the KPC by the Acting President of Kosovo

Among the first meetings he held as soon as he took office, the Chairman of the Kosovo Prosecutorial Council, Jetish Maloku, was received by the Acting President of the Republic of Kosovo, Vjosa Osmani, with whom he discussed the challenges of the prosecutorial system and processes of appointments, reappointments and decrees of new prosecutors, agreeing that these processes should be conducted with high integrity.



On this occasion, Chairman Maloku informed the Acting President that the priority of the KPC is to increase public confidence in the prosecutorial system, reduce the number of old cases, increase the number of prosecutors, improve infrastructure, complete the framework for all work processes, regular performance appraisal and timely disciplinary cases, emphasizing that its goal is to continue cooperation with local and international institutions, in order to achieve the objectives of the prosecutorial system.

Annual Conference of Prosecutors 2021

One of the main events of the year in the scope of the prosecutorial system is the Annual Conference of Prosecutors, which this year was held in the first week of January, in which Chairman Maloku gave an online speech, through which he expressed the visions, development, strengthening and upgrading the prosecutorial system.

Chairman's speech

Honorable Chief State Prosecutor,

Honorable Acting President of the Republic of Kosovo,

Honorable fellow members of the Council and all of you who are part of the prosecutorial system,

Honorable ambassadors and representatives of various embassies operating in Kosovo,

Distinguished guests, representatives of security and justice institutions,

Dear media and civil society,

It is a special pleasure for me as the new Chairman of the Kosovo Prosecutorial Council to address you on the occasion of the Annual Conference of Prosecutors.

It has not been long since I was elected to this position, but I have been part of the leadership in the prosecutorial system for a long time. From this

perspective for me it is a new beginning, but also for you it will be a new beginning because after many achievements we had together in the past, we will face every day many challenges and work which await our decision.

Today we should be proud of our common achievements, but I want to tell you that we will continue to work together to advance the prosecutorial system through the application of the highest standards in decision-making.

Together we will continue to raise the level of accountability, efficiency, quality of work in resolving cases. This goal will make it possible to have a prosecutorial system with integrity, transparency and that enjoys the trust of the public.

The Prosecutorial Council and the State Prosecutor have always had the objective of creating better working conditions, a sufficient number of prosecutors and administrative staff as well as modern infrastructure and equipment, so today I want to assure every employee in the prosecutorial system that all of us together we will achieve this.

We will work together with all units of the Council, the Secretariat, the Prosecution Performance Unit and all our international and local partners to achieve the planned objectives.

We will advance the planning system by working together, we will increase the budget through a better cooperation with the Government and the Assembly of the Republic of Kosovo and we will spend the budget effectively and for the needs of the prosecutorial system.

We will recruit the planned number of prosecutors and administrative staff and work together with the Academy of Justice and our international partners to train and to specialize prosecutors based on their needs for professional and ethical development. On this occasion I want to thank all those who supported these developments over the years.

A few days ago, the Prosecutorial Council was complemented by new members and we are currently in the process of consolidating the standing committees and defining concrete work plans.

I assure you that part of these plans will be the continuous strengthening of the integrity of the

prosecutorial system through a proper system of recruitment of prosecutors based on merit, evaluation of the performance of prosecutors, proactive decision-making which ensures accountability and transparent work based on the law and international standards. Undoubtedly, the focus will be on handling disciplinary cases and I assure you that any incorrect and reprehensible behavior will be taken seriously, violators will be punished sparingly and we will not allow public confidence to be faded, but, the image of the prosecutorial system will be preserved.

Among the priorities of the Council will be the advancement of the status of prosecutors and administrative staff, while the electronic case management system will be further promoted and applied unconditionally, such as the digitalization of work processes everywhere in the prosecutorial system.

For all those who follow the flows in the prosecutorial system,

I would like to emphasize that we highly appreciate and count on the support of our partners from, American Embassy, European Union Office, Embassy of the Kingdom of Norway, Embassy of the United Kingdom, Embassy of Switzerland, Embassy of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, German Embassy, Embassy of Italy, UNDP, GIZ, IRZ, OSCE, Council of Europe, etc.

We all know that the justice system in general and the prosecutorial system in particular have gone through different periods of reforms, which are planned in the future as well.

- Professional development of prosecutors and administrative staff.
- Cooperation and coordination with local and international partners.

Presentation of the General Director of the Secretariat of the Kosovo Prosecutorial Council, Lavdim Krasniqi, on the occasion of the Annual Conference of Prosecutors

Subject: Managing the Impact of Covid-19 within the Prosecutorial System

Introduction:

It is important to contextualize how the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic was managed within the Prosecutorial System and so by way of background, it was in early March 2020 when the first cases of Covid-19 were recorded in Kosovo.

In an attempt to help prevent the spread of the virus, the government's early response included

closing its international borders and introducing restrictions on the movement of citizens in Kosovo.

This impacted all institutions world-wide and ours was no exception; it meant that we had to urgently adapt to new ways of working.

Similar to most institutions world-wide, we had not previously identified key risks to the delivery of justice that such an event might bring and at the time, we didn't have processes in place to assess and mitigate such risks.

Actions to Manage the Covid-19 Crisis:

To address this issue, we held a video conference with the UK Project on 8th April to discuss the Council's response to the pandemic and as a direct result of the conference, a series of actions were identified to manage the crisis.

It was also agreed that a more flexible way of working was needed to ensure that the Prosecutorial System carried on as much as possible with business as usual.

This included some remote working, and further donor coordination with the US secured 29 laptop computers for our prosecutors to use out of the office environment. This was a swift and unprecedented response to the urgent crisis we faced.

A further video conference took place on 21st April with the Chief State Prosecutor and the Chair of the Prosecutorial, at which the Strategy and Action Plan were presented and agreed. It was an informative conference at which international donor representatives were also present, including the US Embassy, UK Embassy and the European Union.

Six days later the Crisis Management Plan was fully implemented across the entire Prosecution Service. A number of critical business functions were identified and in particular cases that might be at risk due to time limits being reached.

Interventions were coordinated by a centrally based 'Executive Crisis Management Team, which met weekly and received reports from Regional Crisis Management Teams led by Chief Prosecutors. This was the first time that a central oversight of critical cases had been made available and it ensured that resources could be focused on safeguarding these cases from failing.

To assess the extent to which the regional offices were complying with the directions issued by the

Executive, a 'dashboard' was created that graded compliance; a team from the Council and Office of the Chief State Prosecutor undertook visits to regional offices to aid this assessment.

A phased relaxation of restrictions was experienced from the end of May and into June 2020. To help manage the transition to office-based working, a Service Resumption Strategy and Return to Work Guidance were produced. This coincided with the reopening of international borders.

The Service Resumption Strategy creates three risk levels that infection rates in the community present to the continuity of normal prosecutorial functions. Each risk level is accompanied by actions to mitigate the risk that must be implemented in each prosecution office. The risk level is regularly reviewed so that the right level of protection from the virus is provided to all of our staff. We are currently at risk level 2 and all prosecution offices have been provided with instructions describing what risk mitigation actions are required.

Impact of actions taken

We have responded and coordinated our actions swiftly in the face of this pandemic and it is important to assess the impact of the actions taken upon performance compared to the same period in 2019.

Firstly, we will assess the impact upon caseload over the same periods in 2019 and 2020. We will now look at the impact upon staff absences for the same period.

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Towards the end of June and into July, infection rates rose and sadly the Judiciary recorded the first deaths of a Judge and of a Prosecutor.

As daily infections started to exceed 250 during late July, remote working was re-introduced and a 'Remote Working Protocol' and accompanying 'Frequently Asked Questions' guide was produced for the Prosecution. At this time there was a targeted refocus upon the weekly reporting and focused interventions, and the Crisis Management approach was also reviewed and adapted to reflect the changing risks.

Impact of actions taken

In September the UK Project commenced a Post Implementation Review which included interviews with Civil Society Organizations and members of the KPC Secretariat Administrative Staff, as well as the Chief Prosecutor of the Basic Prosecution Offices in Pristina.

There have been some very positive comments in respect of how the Prosecution has managed the impact of Covid-19 and how it has affected their perceptions of the Institution and the slide illustrates this from a quote from the director of KIPRED "There is a perception by members of the public that the Prosecution is doing nothing, but I know that they have been working really hard. There is an opportunity for them to strengthen their PR"

Additionally, as a user of the Action Plan, the Chief Prosecutor of the Basic Prosecution Office in Pristina considered that "it's a good plan, it's a perfect plan and we're using the plan".

Lessons Learned

As part of the 'lessons learned' within the Post Implementation Plan, two key topics were identified:

Firstly, it was considered essential that there is a method for identifying key operational risks to the Office of the Chief State Prosecutor and also to the Council. Risk Assessment and Business Continuity Planning also needs to be an integral part of the Strategic Planning Process.

Secondly, there is need for a pre-planned response to a critical event. Such a response requires a structured plan that is regularly tested through 'exercises' and is reviewed and updated.

Ensuring both of these lessons are taken on board and implemented will enable this Institution to respond more swiftly in future.

Next Steps

There are three key parts to the next steps we must take:

Firstly, a formal review should be carried out.

Secondly, we should develop our approach to Crisis Management and Business Continuity as part of the Strategic Planning Process.

Finally, we need to continue to effectively manage the Service Resumption Plan.

Launch of the EU EUKOJUST project

Meanwhile, Chairman Maloku praised the launch of the EUKOJUST project of the European Union, which is implemented within the Program for the justice sector in Kosovo. Its launch was made through the online platform by the Head of the EU Office in Kosovo, Tomas Szunyog, in which case, in addition to the Chairman of the KPC, Jetish Maloku, other heads of the justice system in Kosovo also participated ambassadors and representatives of other local and international institutions.



In his speech, Chairman Maloku, said that the previous phases of this project have shown that extraordinary work and excellent coordination has been done, so he believes that this project will advance and strengthen the justice system in line with European and international standards.

According to the Chairman of the KPC, the activities of the EUKOJUST project will strengthen the accountability, transparency, professionalism, quality and effectiveness of the prosecutorial system.

This project is implemented by a consortium, which consists of the German Foundation for International Legal Cooperation (IRZ), as a managing partner and new partners from the Dutch Center for International Legal Cooperation (CILC) and the Ministry of Justice of Croatia.

Chairman Maloku: “Professionalism, dedication and teamwork of the administration will have my unstinting support”

After assuming the position of Chairman, Mr. Jetish Maloku held a meeting with the Director of the KPCS and the heads of units, who in addition to being an informant, also aimed to express his support and encouragement for the work and ongoing commitment and joint staff of KPC administrative staff to implement the priorities and objectives set for 2021.



“Of course, the increase of the performance and professional capacities of the administrative staff and their adequate planning will be in the service of advancing and strengthening the services of the KPC administration, which is the central administration for the entire prosecutorial system ”, said the Chairman of the Council Prosecutor, Jetish Maloku.

Consequently, Chairman Maloku stated before the leaders of the organizational units of the KPSS, that, indeed, he expects that their teamwork and commitment will always be in the service of advancing and strengthening administrative capacity. *“The professionalism, dedication, discipline and teamwork of the KPC administration will have my unstinting support, only that, together, we will have effectiveness and efficiency to achieve the goals ahead ”, said Chairman Maloku.*

The Director of the KPSS, Lavdim Krasniqi, on behalf of the staff of the Secretariat, congratulated the Chairman Maloku for his election as head of the KPC, expressing readiness to be maximally committed to all administration services to be in full support of KPC and SP.

The ICT-CMIS project progress report is presented

The presentation of the ICT-CMIL Project Steering Board Report was attended by the Chairman of the Kosovo Prosecutorial Council, Jetish Maloku, the Chairman of the Kosovo Judicial Council, Skender Çoçaj, and representatives of the Norwegian Embassy in Pristina, the Council of

Europe in Pristina, the Ministry of Justice, as well as local and foreign experts.

The CMIS project report contains the period July-December 2020. The following are the main achievements for this period are discussed and the annual work plan of the ICT-CMIS Project for 2021 is approved.



The Chairman of the KPC, Jetish Maloku, said that despite the situation created by the pandemic, the CMIS project has successfully continued the implementation of activities planned for this year in the prosecutorial system, including the implementation in the Appellate Prosecution, automatic distribution of cases in basic prosecutions and the exchange of data electronically between the Kosovo Police, prosecution offices and courts.

Chairman Maloku, added that for KPC, the ICT / CMIS project is one of the most important projects, therefore all activities of the Work Plan for 2021 of this project will have the support for implementation in due time and with results as best.

The USAID project “Justice Activity in Kosovo” is presented”

Cooperation and implementation of joint projects with partners and donors of the prosecutorial system was the focus of the activities of the Chairman of the Kosovo Prosecutorial Council, Jetish Maloku, who received in a meeting the USAID Project Director "Activity for Justice in Kosovo", Geralyn Busnardo and Deputy Director Florije Manaj-Zogaj, on which occasion they

presented the dynamics of activities within the Project "Justice activity in Kosovo".

The Chairman of the KPC thanked the Director of this project for the contribution of USAID at all times, expressing readiness for cooperation in carrying out the activities envisaged for the prosecutorial system.

"We welcome at all times the joint efforts to improve the quality of services of the prosecutorial system through this project, in which case we will have as a result the increase of public trust, strengthening and capacity building of the prosecutorial system of Kosovo", said Chairman Maloku.



On the other hand, the Director of this project, Geralyn Busnardo, expressed her congratulations on the assumption of office by the new Chairman of the KPC, informing him about this five-year program, which will be implemented to support the efforts of justice institutions in Kosovo, increasing public trust in justice institutions, civil society organizations and other key actors in improving the provision of citizens' access to quality justice services.

This program will be implemented by the American company, "Chemonics International Inc.", based in Washington.

Priorities for strengthening accountability, efficiency and transparency are discussed

As part of the multidimensional cooperation with the Embassy of the United States of America in Pristina, Chairman Maloku held an online meeting with the representative of the Embassy, Lana Morton-Owens, with whom he discussed concrete support by providing expertise for the

implementation of acts bylaws on performance appraisal of prosecutors and the necessary support for the Prosecutorial Council, its committees and the new Chairperson in future work processes.



Consequently, in this meeting, other joint processes were discussed, such as the drafting of the Manual for the support of investigative panels, plans and other activities foreseen for implementation in KPC, and at the end of this meeting, it was said that it is important to have continuous and on-line coordination for key recommendations arising from the various processes, including increasing the accountability, efficiency and transparency of the justice system.

Urgent meeting, KPC suspends a prosecutor

The Kosovo Prosecutorial Council, chaired by Chairman Jetish Maloku, held an urgent meeting, in which it addressed the request of the competent authority for disciplinary violations by a prosecutor of the Basic Prosecution in Prishtina.



In this case, the KPC has taken a unanimous decision to suspend the prosecutor in question, and has established an Investigative Panel, which will handle the case and recommend to the KPC the final decision.

The Chairman of the Prosecutorial Council meets with the representatives of the Judicial Union

Chairman Maloku hosted a meeting of the Acting President of the Kosovo Judicial Union, Bahri Jashari, as well as other representatives of this union, a meeting which aimed to discuss the needs and priorities related to the legal implementation of the status of employees of the Council administration and prosecutors of the country.

Representatives of the Kosovo Judicial Union have addressed a number of requests, such as: the realization of the special legal status of employees of the administration of the judicial and prosecutorial system and the implementation of issues related to equality of powers, which is explicitly mentioned by the Constitutional Court, adequate financial treatment, involvement of the trade union in the processes of administrative reform and filling the necessary capacities for work.



In this regard, Chairman Maloku, said that he will not lack his maximum efforts to support the requirements of the administration, so that it is functional and as stable as possible, as well as has a positive performance.

Workshop: Initial Report of the IPA project, EUKOJUST is presented

The European Union EUKOJUST project, implemented within the Program for the justice sector in Kosovo, has held a workshop, in which its initial report was presented.



From the Kosovo Prosecutorial Council in this workshop participated the General Director of the Secretariat, Lavdim Krasniqi, in which case the initial findings regarding the implementation of the project activities in the justice institutions of Kosovo that are beneficiaries of this project were presented.

The representative of KPC has expressed readiness for maximum commitment to achieve the objectives of this project in the next phases. Also, during this meeting, the readiness of the local institutions benefiting from this project was expressed for continuous cooperation and coordination until its full realization.

Administrative capacity building activities are coordinated

The General Director of the Secretariat of the Kosovo Prosecutorial Council, Lavdim Krasniqi, met with representatives of the Institutional Development Component within the British project “Strengthening the Judicial System in Kosovo”.

The purpose of the meeting was to coordinate issues of performance enhancement and professional capacity of administrative staff, planning and risk management, as well as opportunities to provide expertise for advancing the services of the administration of the prosecutorial system in Kosovo.



In the framework of the implementation of this project was discussed the professional support that will be provided to the Secretariat of the KPC regarding the drafting of bylaws for administrative staff and the overall capacity building.

On this occasion, the British experts expressed their high willingness to provide the necessary expertise on all issues discussed at this meeting.

Activities of the KPC Secretariat

During January 2021, numerous activities were conducted within the Secretariat of the KPC, in which case in terms of cooperation with foreign partners were held several meetings with project experts, which support the building of administrative capacity of the prosecutorial system, like that of IPA, and the Dutch project, CILC.

Activities of working groups were also developed for the drafting and finalization of the Work Report of the Prosecutorial Council for 2020 and the Work Plan of the Prosecutorial Council for 2021.

Consequently, the activities have continued with the preparation of the Annual Conference of Prosecutors for 2020.

Meanwhile, the Annual Report for the Central Harmonization Unit of Internal Audit (MoF) was submitted).

The legal sector has prepared and published the Summary of bylaws of the prosecutorial system for the period 2011-2020, which is now

available for the needs of the prosecutorial system.

For the field of internal and external communication, the drafting of strategic acts of internal and external communication has been prepared, such as: Draft Strategy for communication of the prosecutorial system 2021-2023, drafted by the Working Group of the prosecutorial system, which will proceed soon for approval by the Council, as well as to coordinate the drafting of the Guide and Manual for Crisis Situations in the Prosecutorial System, prepared by the German Institute for International Legal Cooperation (IRZ).

In the framework of the implementation of activities arising from the field of European integration, the Report was sent to the online platform for the implementation of short-term measures of the NPISAA for 2020, and the response to the request of the GLPS regarding the implementation of the Council measures was returned in the NPISAA.

From the scope of human resources procurement and administration has been prepared the Evaluation Report for the staff of the Kosovo prosecutorial system.

Whereas, one of the activities of the information technology sector was the preparation of the Management Plan for the maintenance of the Data Center in the Palace of Justice, then the preparation of a Manual for raising knowledge in the use of IT equipment, which will be distributed to the staff of the prosecutorial system.

Also, the preparation of the Activity Plan of the ICT / CMIS project for 2021 has been done, and the following have been presented: The module of administration of prosecutors' files, the module of transfer and advancement of the electronic system of management of prosecutors' files. Meanwhile, the development of the Expenditure Module in the electronic system E-finance is continuing.

In the sector for human resources, procurement and administration, work was done according to

the request and institutional needs, in which case supervision, management and coordination of the main activities of this important sector was developed.

In the budget and finance sector, the budget was committed and allocated at the request of KPC, and there was systematic supervision, management and coordination of key activities for the budget, finances and general services.

During this period, meetings were held with the institutions signing the Memorandum of Cooperation for the electoral process of February 14, 202. Following is the drafted the Annual Report for 2020 of the Tracking Mechanism for characteristic criminal offenses, the Annual Report of the Commission for evaluation of the performance of prosecutors for inclusion in the Council Annual Report and the 2020 Annual Report of the Ad-Hoc Oversight Committee for the implementation of the Strategic Plan for the fight against corruption and economic crime.

Activities of the Prosecution Performance Review Unit

As part of the activities carried out in January by the Prosecution Performance Review Unit was the preparation of the necessary statistical data for the drafting of the annual work report of the RP for 2020 and the work plan of the RP for 2021.

Consequently, in the framework of the support requested by other institutions, the data of the lists of candidates for the general elections 2021 were checked and verified to confirm whether there is a prosecutor in the list according to the request of the CEC and an accompanying letter was drafted for this list.

An information report has also been prepared for the OSCE on the total number of prosecutors and KPC members for 2020.

On the other hand, the provision of data has continued systematically, in which case the sectors have completed the records required by the CEPEJ project for the number of prosecutors, the

level of prosecutors and the data in the files of prosecutors - SEMDP have been updated. The development of SEMDP was also supported through control and comments on the design of relevant modules and data were extracted and processed on the number of prosecutors and the number of cases in the Basic Prosecution in Prishtina for the period 2013-2020.

The Director of the PPRU and representatives of the PMAP participated in a virtual form in the meeting regarding the development of the training module within the SEMDP and the coordination of activities within the PMAP and other organizational units in the PPRU.

The activities of the Statistical Office have been developed through the compilation of statements on the workload and efficiency of prosecutors in resolving cases from the registers: PP, PPM, PPN, PPP and NJU, for each prosecutor separately, for the month of December and for the year 2021.

The focus was also on the preparation of reports on criminal offenses related to violence against journalists and the LGBT community, then on the application of alternative procedures, statistical reports on trafficking in minors, reports on the Unit for Combating Corruption and Economic Crimes, reports for the Office of the Coordinator for Economic Crimes and Sequestration and Confiscation of Property.

In the framework of the implementation of public transparency, statistical reports have been prepared for NGOs: "Speak", "Get up", KLI, etc., for the MEI for European integration and the SAA and the process of harmonization of data has been monitored. statistics between KPC, law enforcement agencies and courts, for January 2021, as well as the summary report for 2021.

Also, the activities of the Training Office have been focused on cooperation with the Kosovo Academy of Justice and international partners, which provide profiled training, in which case within the Program for continuous training, the Academy of Justice has conducted training through "Zoom" platform for criminal offenses against narcotics, with special emphasis when

committed in an organized form, where the applied methodology was of a combined character, with theoretical explanations and interactive discussions. Beneficiaries of the training were 13 prosecutors. Then the training on subject and territorial competencies was conducted according to the Law on Minor Offenses.

In cooperation with the USAID Program, implemented through the "Zoom" platform by "Checchi and Company", mediation training was conducted and in cooperation with the EU project "Civil Code Support: Phase 2", a roundtable was held through the platform "Zoom" for harmonization of court decisions in civil-family cases.
